Colorado Centennial Farms

The *Colorado Centennial Farms* program acknowledges farms and ranches that have been owned and operated by the same family for 100 years or more. The program was established to honor the significant role that these families have played in settling and shaping the state of Colorado.

Today, each *Colorado Centennial Farm* represents the strength, courage, and perseverance of the families who have worked their land for generations despite the economic challenges of modern agriculture.

Background

In 1986 a collaborative effort among then Governor Richard D. Lamm, the Colorado Historical Society (now History Colorado), and the Colorado Department of Agriculture created the *Colorado Centennial Farms* program to recognize the important role agriculture has played in our state's history and economic development.

Today, the program is administered by the State Historical Fund, a program of History Colorado. *Colorado Centennial Farms* is the first program of its kind in the nation to give a Historic Structures Award to families who have successfully preserved historic buildings on their farms and ranches. The National Trust for Historic Preservation provides this additional recognition.

Why are Centennial Farms important?

Across the nation, family farms and ranches, historic barns, and other agricultural sites are disappearing at an alarming rate. In Colorado, the family farm and working cattle ranch serve as a reminder of how the West was settled.

Colorado Centennial Farms recognizes the contributions of Colorado's long-standing ranching and farming families who have withstood the pressures of growth, changes in farming methods, drought, and economic conditions for generations in order to preserve these important pieces of our state's commercial and cultural history.

The *Colorado Centennial Farms* program not only illustrates the significance of agricultural sites to the development of Colorado, but also shows how vital these properties are to the well-being of our state today. *Colorado Centennial Farms* provide open space and food, as well as support for our state's economy and a reminder of our past.

How do farms and ranches qualify?

- Nominees must meet the following requirements:
- Farms or ranches must have remained in the same family continuously for 100 years or more
- Property must be a working farm or ranch
- Property must have a minimum of 160 acres—however, properties with fewer than 160 acres can qualify if they gross at least \$1,000 in annual sales
- Properties that have four or more well-maintained structures that are at least 50 years old are also eligible for a Historic Structures Award

How do I apply?

To apply for *Colorado Centennial Farms* designation, owners must submit an application providing information about the history of the property and its buildings and indicating that the farm or ranch meets the program's requirements. For the Historic Structures Award, photographs of the buildings are required. Application forms must be mailed to the State Historical Fund by April 30th each year. PRESERVING YOUR FARM

The Colorado Heritage and Agritourism Program celebrates Colorado's agricultural roots and rich cultural heritage. This innovative concept creates unique and authentic opportunities for visitors to step off the beaten path and engage in a myriad of culinary, heritage, and agricultural offerings.

According to the USDA Census of Agriculture, Colorado has at least 8,331 barns built prior to 1960.

In 1987 the National Trust for Historic Preservation in partnership with *Successful Farming* magazine created the BARN AGAIN! program to assist farmers and ranchers with maintaining historic buildings and adapting them to modern agricultural production. BARN AGAIN! offered technical and educational information to property owners, and from 1987 to 2009 the National Trust hosted annual awards for excellence in barn rehabilitation and agricultural preservation.

Today you can find BARN AGAIN! program information online, including topics such as how to straighten a failing barn, how to stop water damage to barn foundations, how to repair damaged siding, what roof materials to select for building maintenance, how to find salvaged building materials, and how to locate a qualified contractor.



Benefits of Designation

- Formal recognition of a property's importance to the history of the community and the state of Colorado
- A body of information to use for local community planning, tourist promotion, and neighborhood revitalization
- A sense of community history and local pride
- Eligibility to compete for grants from Colorado's State Historical Fund
- Eligibility to apply for state and federal tax credits for restoration, rehabilitation, or preservation of designated properties

National Register of Historic Places

The National Register of Historic Places is the official list of the nation's historic places that are worthy of preserving. Authorized by the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, the National Park Service's National Register of Historic Places is part of a nationwide program to coordinate and support public and private efforts to identify, evaluate, and protect America's historic and archeological resources.

Colorado State Register of Historic Properties

The Colorado State Register of Historic Properties is a list of the state's significant cultural resources that are worthy of preserving for the future education and enjoyment of Colorado's residents and visitors. Properties listed include buildings, structures, objects, districts, and archaeological sites.

Nomination Process

Properties may be nominated to the National or State Register by the owner, a local government, an agency, or History Colorado, but all nominations must have owner approval. The nominator must submit sufficient information to establish the property's historical significance and eligibility for inclusion based on the National or State Register criteria.





STATE FAIR HISTORIC DISTRICT

Much of the Colorado State Fairgrounds is listed as a historic district on the Colorado State Register of Historic Properties, which is a listing of the state's significant cultural resources worthy of preservation for the future education and enjoyment of Colorado's residents and visitors. Areas of significance include agriculture, education, entertainment, recreation, and social history.


The grounds contain an assortment of buildings and structures representing various styles, configurations, and functions. Several eras of development are evident: 1910–1920 utilitarian, the WPA (Works Progress Administration) of the 1930s, and 1940–1960s modern. Each era of development added their signature style to the mix that now comprises the State Fairgrounds and Exposition Center.





















HISTORIC BUILDINGS AT THE STATE FAIR



1908–18: Cultural Heritage Center


Remnants of the oldest building can be seen in the octagonal rear addition: this eight-sided building originally had open sides much like a gazebo. A cupola, possibly used for ventilation, sits upon a tent-like roof.



1920s: Small Animal Building

Additional Buildings: Gallery of Fine Arts, the Creative Arts Building and parts of the 4-H Dormitories

Originally built for livestock, the building dates to 1921 and had an open courtyard when first constructed. The interior is open with exposed beams and trusses supporting the roof. The courtyard was later covered with a monitor roof that adds light to the interior space.



1930s: Horse Stalls

Additional Buildings: Sheep & Swine Building, Colorado Pavilion, Administration Building, perimeter wall, 4-H Dining Hall, 4-H Auditorium, Children's Barnyard, Grandstand

The New Deal and WPA brought many remarkable buildings around Colorado, and the Pueblo area is no exception. A defining feature of many WPA buildings and structures is the well-crafted stone construction, which can be seen on the Horse Stalls, one of the most interesting buildings on the grounds. Stone and concrete arches front an arcade that lines the entire U-shaped facility.



1940s: Palace of Agriculture

Additional Buildings: Feed Barn, FFA Dorm, Natural Resources Building

Construction began in 1940, but the building took an entire decade to complete. It features modern, streamlined design elements, such as rounded corners, entrance awnings, and a simple flat parapet, all of which were becoming popular at the time.



1960s: Livestock Pavilion

The Space Age of the 1960s influenced building design through "butterfly roofs" and tapered columns. These concepts can be seen on the Livestock Pavilion and the associated open stalls. Large metal trusses and columns allow for a judging arena free of obstruction while the outside stalls are covered by folded-plate roofs that form an accordion configuration. The same roofline can be seen on the adjoining Dairy Bar.





STATE HISTORICAL FUND AT THE FAIR

The State Historical Fund (SHF) was created by the 1990 constitutional amendment allowing limited gaming in the towns of Cripple Creek, Central City, and Black Hawk. The amendment directs that a portion of gaming tax revenue be used for historic preservation throughout the state. SHF assists with a wide variety of projects, including restoration and rehabilitation of historic buildings, architectural assessments, archaeological excavations, designation and interpretation of historic places, preservation planning studies, and education and training programs.

SHF has funded projects at the Colorado State Fairgrounds in order to preserve this historic place that is enjoyed by thousands of people both during the fair and throughout the year. The large, complex site contains a variety of buildings and structures, so planning is critical.

SHF has funded rehabilitation and preservation projects at several buildings at the fairgrounds:

- Horse Stalls (North and South Buildings)
- 4-H Dining Hall
- 4-H Auditorium
- Colorado Pavilion
- CSU Pueblo Building
- Fine Arts Building

HISTORY OF THE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE



History Colorado

A separate state agency devoted to agriculture did not exist in 1933 when the Division of Agriculture was created. Before this date, many agricultural functions were dispersed among state and local government agencies. Led by a governor-appointed Director of Agriculture, the Division of Agriculture combined the functions of many of these groups. The 1949 Agricultural Act created the State Agricultural Commission, an 8-member board headed by a State Agricultural Commissioner. Today the Agricultural Commission has nine members, who determine the general policies for administering and enforcing regulatory and service laws, rules, and regulations.

Important Dates:

- In 1881 a State Board of Inspection Commissioners was created by an act of the General Assembly.
- In 1883 the Colorado Horticultural Society was made a state bureau.
- In 1885 the Office of the State Dairy Commissioner was created.
- In 1903 the Board of Inspection Commissioners was re-created as the State Board of Stock Inspection Commissioners.
- In 1911 a State Fair Board, composed of the State Board of Agriculture and State Board of Horticulture, was created.
- In 1917 a State Fair Commission was established, giving official status to the annual Colorado State Fair at Pueblo.
- In 1933 the Division of Agriculture was created.
- In 1949 a substantial reorganization and centralization of agricultural functions occurred with passage of the Agricultural Act.
- The State Fair Commission was temporarily placed as an independent agency under the Executive Department in 1949 until 1968 when it was transferred to the Department of Agriculture as a division.
- In 1969 the Division of Inspection and Consumer Services was added to the department.

CENTENNIAL FARM SPOTLIGHT: Linke Ranch (#85)

Skiing may seem an unlikely legacy on a ranch—but not in Colorado. A few days after Christmas in 1883, Emil Linke strapped on skis and headed across snowy meadows to fetch the midwife to help deliver the first of 10 Linke children.

Before settling in the mountains, however, Emil's journey to America began in 1866 when he left Germany at age 20. First he worked as a carpenter in West Virginia, but the promise of gold lured him west. Instead of gold, he struck silver at the Iowa Mine in Silverton. Without the resources to develop the claim, he sold it for \$6,000 and took his money to Denver where he met and married Sophie Weil, a young German waitress. The couple then headed to the mountains over Rollins Pass and settled on Eight Mile Creek, a tributary of the Fraser River on a stagecoach route. Emil cut trees to build a log cabin, a barn and corrals. He cleared pastures and trenched irrigation ditches. He also built a one-room schoolhouse where the Linke children eventually learned to speak English in lieu of their household German.

Later, it was Emil's son Edwin, who was able to save the family homestead despite enduring many hardships including economic pressures from the Great Depression, a severe drought in 1934 and a house fire in 1942. Today Eddie Linke, Edwin's son, runs the operation now called the Cottonwood Ranch, where he raises cattle, quarter horses and hay. Eddie's son Trey, Emil's great-grandson, teaches skiing at Winter Park Ski Area and also lives on the ranch to help with chores.

CENTENNIAL FARM SPOTLIGHT: Hotchkiss Ranch (#116)

Born in 1832 to a Scotch-Irish family in Pennsylvania, Enos T. Hotchkiss was 27 years old when he came west to seek his fortune. He arrived in Colorado in 1874, where he struck a vein and discovered the Golden Fleece Mine near what is now Lake City. He then went on to build toll roads with friend Otto Mears, known as the pathfinder to the San Juans, but after a few years Enos set out on a different quest—this time for land. Traveling north along what is now called the Blue Mesa Road, Enos found what he was looking for—a spot in the North Fork Valley where a town today bears his name.

In 1881, Enos built an adobe house on the land, and a year later, brought in the valley's first herd of cattle—1,500 head. Then in 1889, he added a flock of sheep. Today, the Hotchkiss Ranch runs more than 4,000 ewes, considered a large herd by Colorado standards. With that many sheep, chores on the ranch take on grand proportions, whether it's lambing, shearing or moving sheep to summer pasture. In springtime as many as 400 lambs are born during the height of the lambing season. While sheep ranching is a tough way to make a living, the Hotchkiss family has been doing it for more than 100 years and hopes to be here for many more.

CENTENNIAL FARM SPOTLIGHT: Gallegos Ranch (#135)

While most of the immigrants to the Colorado Territory came from the east, a significant group of settlers came from the south, and their influence adds a rich heritage to our state. One such group included seven men who journeyed north of Taos during the summer of 1851 and founded San Luis—Colorado's oldest town. They laid out the town as a typical Mexican village, with a plaza surrounded by adobe homes and a common area set-aside just east of town where residents grazed livestock.

Dario Gallegos, one of San Luis' original settlers, ran sheep and grew cauliflower, beets and cabbage. Today the land remains in the family and is still a working ranch because of the family's inventive and devoted practices. In addition to going to college and working outside jobs, so they could make ends meet, the Gallegos family found it necessary to diversify. Now the ranch's main product is beef cattle, having switched from sheep in 1943. And while the Gallegos family continues to raise some sheep, goats, geese and horses, as well as harvest the orchard planted more than 100 years ago, they have also expanded into organic vegetables—growing crops such as English peas and Bolita beans—in order to keep up with market trends. At 8,000 feet, and receiving only nine inches of rain a year, the Gallegos Ranch is made green by irrigation. The family still holds the oldest water rights in the state, with decrees dated 1855 and 1856, a vital asset that Joe Gallegos, Dario's great-grandson, protects with vigilance and political savvy.
