## SOPHOMORE CLASS HISTORY

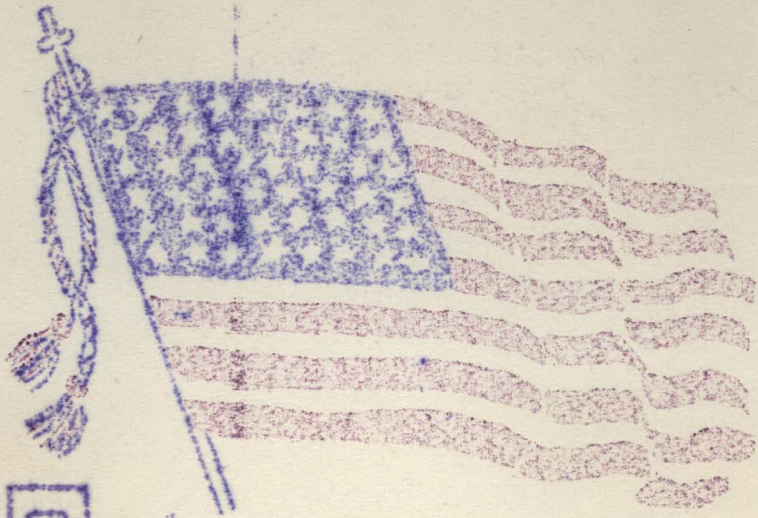

On August 30, 1943, nineteen eager freshman students began their freshman school year at the Eckley High School.

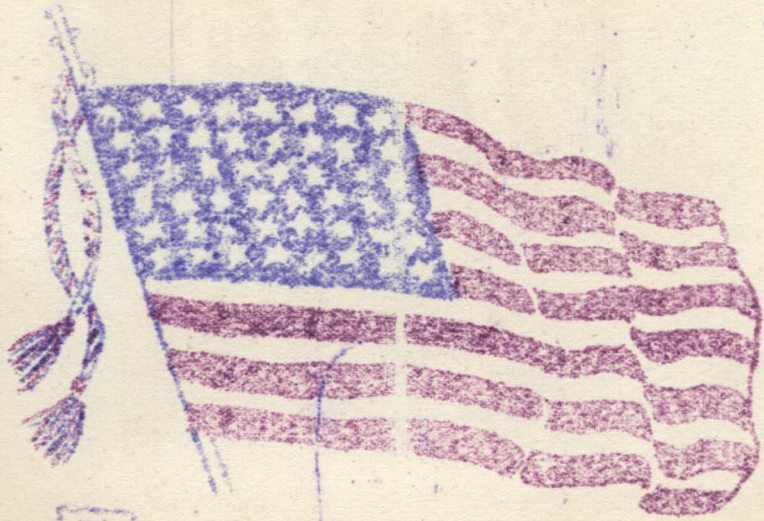

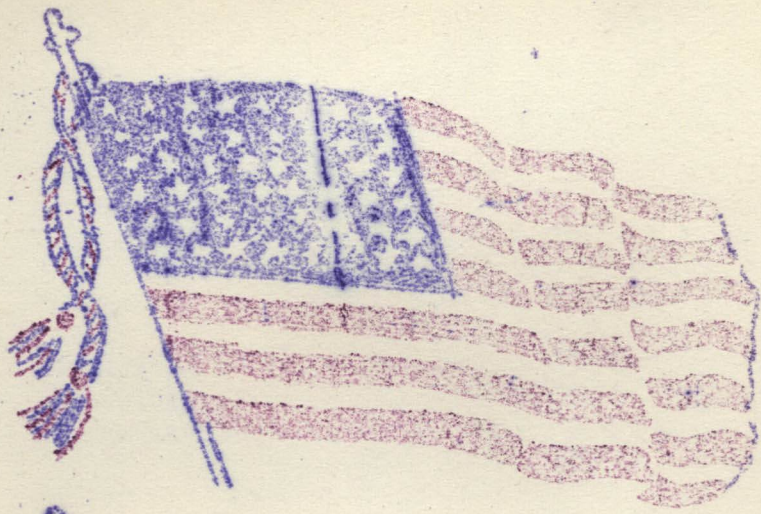

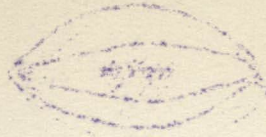

# FOOTBALL

Eckley's six-man Football team had a fairly successful season, winning the six-man Football Circus at Wray, on October 8, by defeating all opponents, and by taking second place in the Yuma County League. The Championship of the League was lost to Laird by one game, the only defeat Eckley received.

Fourteen boys wore football suits this season and received either regular football awards or service awards. These awards were given on the basis of time played in games and conscientious effort in training. The team was coached by the principal, Mr. C. F. Williams.

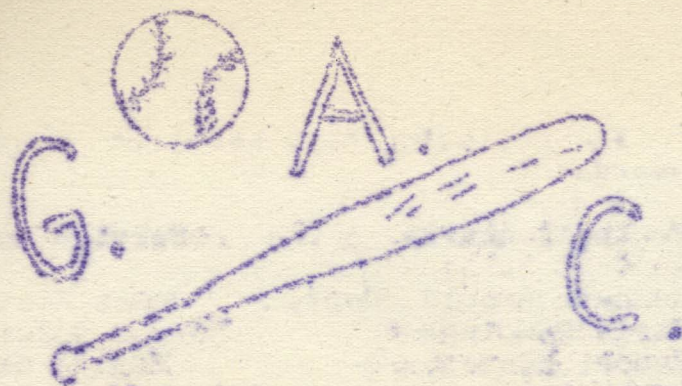

The maid (Jean Armagost) fell in love with Babs Boswell; and when she found out the butler was a girl, she called her big brother (Bob Yenter), who was a prize fighter, to clean up on the whole bunch. Mr. Nelson, (Eugene Gardner) and Mrs. Nelson, (Esther Gardner), were very interested in the events of their children's lives, and were the typical father and mother.

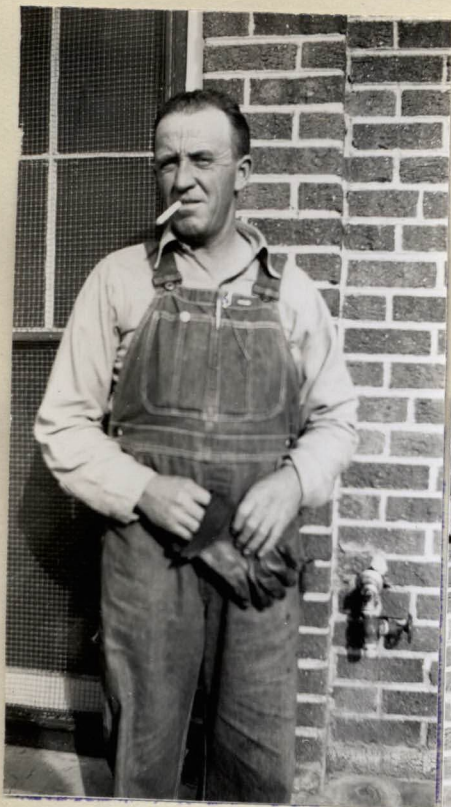

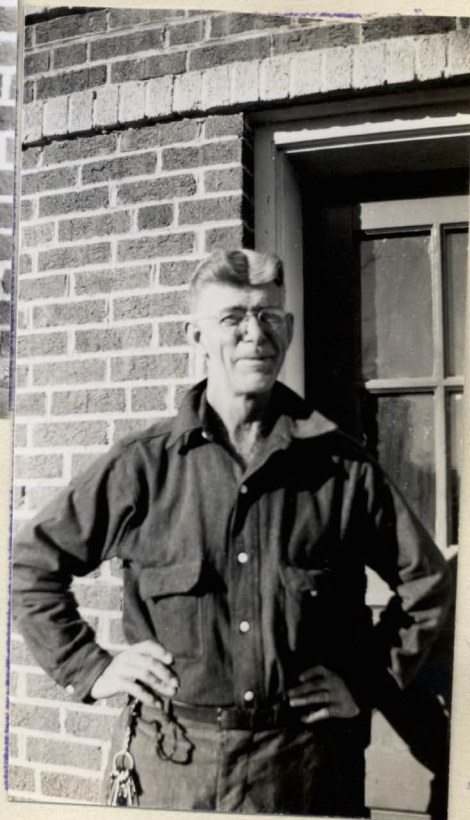
